Prof. Adam Knee - (University of Nottingham Ningbo China)

Adam Knee is Professor of Film and Media Studies and Head of the School of International Communications at the University of Nottingham Ningbo China, having formerly held teaching posts at Nanyang Technological University in Singapore and Ohio University in the US, and served as a Fulbright grantee at Chulalongkorn University in Thailand. He has published widely in the areas of US and Southeast Asian popular cinema, most recently in the journal *Horror Studies* and the anthology *Asian Cinema and the Use of Space: Interdisciplinary Perspectives* (Routledge, 2015). Ari Purnama is a PhD candidate and practitioner in film and visual communication studies at the University of Groningen, The Netherlands. His doctoral research examines stylistic innovations and constraints in post-New Order Indonesian cinematic visual storytelling (1998-2014). In 2014 he was appointed as a visiting research fellow at the Communication Arts Department, University of Wisconsin-Madison. He has written and directed several short fiction films independently as well as for CinemAsia Film Festival, Amsterdam, focusing on the theme of inter-generational conflict. Dafna Ruppin holds a PhD in Media and Performance Studies from Utrecht University, The Netherlands. Her recently completed dissertation, titled *The Komedi Bioscoop: The Emergence of Movie-going in Colonial Indonesia*, 1896-1914 (defended in April 2015), focuses on the exhibition, consumption and production of early cinema in the Netherlands Indies. This research forms part of the research project "The Nation and Its Other" funded by the Netherlands Organisation for Scientific Research (NWO). She has published several articles in academic journals and books, and has presented her work in various conferences ranging in focus, including early cinema, history of movie-going, and Southeast Asian Studies.

Ekky Imanjaya (PhD candidate, University of East Anglia)

Ekky Imanjaya is a PhD candidate in the School of Art, Media, and American Studies at the University of East Anglia. He is also faculty member of the Film Department, BINUS INTERNATIONAL, Bina Nusantara University, Jakarta. Prof. Ellen Rafferty (University of Wisconsin-Madison, USA)

Ellen Rafferty is Chair of the Department of Languages and Cultures of Asia at University Wisconsin-Madison and Professor of Indonesian Language and Literature. Her research interests include Indonesian language teaching and assessment, literature, and sociolinguistic and pragmatic aspects of Indonesian language. Her most recent works include the two textbook series published by U. Hawaii Press, Ayo berbahasa Indonesia for oral skills and Asyik berbahasa Indonesia for grammatical and writing skills. She designed a set of listening comprehension lessons based on popular Indonesian films entitled, Warung Sinema http://warungsinema.wisc.edu/lessons/lessons.html . Her work on Putu Wijaya includes an introduction and translations of a number of short stories in Bomb: Indonesian short stories by Putu Wijaya and an edited volume, Putu Wijaya in performance: a script and study in Indonesian theatre.

Eric Sasono (PhD candidate, Kings College London)

Eric Sasono is an Indonesian film critic and an independent researcher on Indonesian film. He graduated from University of Nottingham, UK with dissertation on *The Act of Killing* and Public Sphere in Indonesia. He is now doing his PhD in film studies at King's College, London.

Dr Felicia Hughes-Freeland (SOAS, University of London)

Felicia Hughes-Freeland gained her PhD in anthropology at SOAS and trained in documentary filmmaking at the National Film and Television School. Until 2011 she was Reader in Anthropology at Swansea University. She is now an independent scholar and is a Research Associate in the Centre for Southeast Asian Studies at SOAS. In Indonesia she has researched performance, television and cinema, and she has also filmed performance in Java, Bali and Laos. Her books and films include *The Dancer and the Dance* (45 mins 1988); *Tayuban: Dancing the Spirit in Java* (30 mins, 1996); *Ritual, Performance, Media* (Routledge 1998) and *Embodied Communities: Dance Traditions and Change in Java* (Berghahn Books 2010). She is is currently working on 'My Name is Ratu Kidul', a collaborative film project with the Indonesian artists Seruni Bodjawati and Wara Anindyah.



Dr Fridus Steijlen (KITLV, Leiden)

Fridus Steijlen is senior researcher at KITLV (Royal Netherlands Institute of Southeast Asian and Caribbean Studies) in Leiden, the Netherlands. He is working on postcolonial migration from Indonesia and daily life in present day Indonesia. He coordinates the audiovisual project 'Recording the Future'. This is an ambitious long-term data-generating research project creating an audiovisual archive on everyday life in Indonesia. So far, an archive has been created of some 500 hours of recordings, which have been indexed and made accessible for research on site. In addition, the project has produced several documentaries and a DVD for advanced language teaching. In 2008 an exhibition, '24 Hours Indonesia', was organized at the Tropical Museum in Amsterdam. The documentary 'Don't forget to remember me', was screened on the online film festival 'Culture unplugged' and in 2014 at the film festival in Douarnenez, France.

Dr Gerald Sim (Florida Atlantic University)

Gerald Sim is Associate Professor of Film Studies at Florida Atlantic University and the author of *The Subject of Film and Race: Retheorizing Politics, Ideology, and Cinema* (Bloomsbury Academic, 2014). His current book project examines the postcolonial aesthetics of Southeast Asian cinema. His essays have been published in venues such as *Discourse, Rethinking Marxism, Projections, Quarterly Review of Film and Video, Film Quarterly,* and *Inter-Asia Cultural Studies*.

Gerardus M Adhyanggono (PhD candidate, University of Lancaster)

Gerardus M Adhyanggono is a PhD candidate at Lancaster University under the DGHE scholarship program.
