A critical understanding through case studies of how the Global South is covered in the Western press 3. A special focus on journalisms in the Global South including the Middle East, South Asia and Africa 4. A comprehensive understanding of newsroom practices 5. Understanding of the various approaches to study journalism and its applicability in the Global South 6. Advanced skills in critical and comparative analysis, research and writing about the social, political and cultural impacts of Journalism in a digital world

A comprehensive understanding of the different histories of Journalism in the Global South 3. An understanding of the relationship between political economy and journalism 4. A critical understanding of the relationship between journalistic discourse and power 5. A solid grasp of newsroom practices and news theories 6. A regional or country based specialisation depending on the candidate's choice

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Acquisition of Learning Outcomes through attendance on the core course, <u>Theoretical and Contemporary Issues in International Journalisms</u> over two terms, including attending lectures, seminars and other teaching sessions. Students are required to attend all classes, study and engage in library and online research extensively on their own and prepare coursework or complete research 	

<p>projects at the end of each term. Most courses are assessed by essay and project work, although some options outside the Centre may also require students to sit an unseen exam at the end of the course. The two-term core course and the various options on offer to the students of MA International Journalisms provide the variety needed to understand the complexity of the issues involved as they pertain to Asia, Middle East and Africa.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• The programme provides for a detailed analysis of the key debates regarding the spread, take-up and impact of journalisms in the Global South. Options deal with specific issues, including media in development, urban culture, media and film production, reception and practice. Regional options provide broader regional understanding within which specific media and communicative practices are situated. Thematic courses enhance the analytic focus on the economic, political or cultural dynamics of digital technologies and practices. Students are also encouraged through courses in the Arts and Humanities Faculty to move beyond their core area of interests and explore other options.• The Research Methods course, which is being made a compulsory course (not assessed) for all our MA students, provides more practical skills in participant-observation, interviewing techniques, how to use the Internet for research, bibliographical searches, working with archives, research ethics and how to choose research and dissertation topics.• For students interested in skills, an optional module is being planned across the School of Arts that will include video editing and shooting, web-related skills, recording and work experience with SOAS Radio. Students choosing to engage in video, radio and online practice are free to create forms of journalism which they think incorporate the voices, values and perspectives of those in the Global South more effectively. So graduates of this course will gain a range of critical and practical skills which they can offer to alternative and mainstream journalistic outlets, as well as being equipped to engage in journalistic or semi-journalistic projects for community, non-governmental and other development organisations.

General statement on contact hours – postgraduate programmes
<p>Masters programmes consist of 180 credits, made up of taught modules of 30 or 15 credits, taught over 10 or 20 weeks, and a dissertation of 60 credits. The programme structure shows which modules are compulsory and which optional.</p> <p>As a rough guide, 1 credit equals approximately 10 hours of work. Most of this will be independent study (see https://www.soas.ac.uk/admissions/ug/teaching/) such as reading and research, preparing coursework, revising for examinations and so on. Also included is class time, for example lectures, seminars and other classes. Some subjects may have more class time than others – a typical example of this are language acquisition modules.</p> <p>At SOAS, most postgraduate modules have a one-hour lecture and a one-hour seminar every week, but this does vary.</p> <p>More information can be found on individual module pages.</p>
