

The Alphawood Scholarships at SOAS

The <u>Southeast Asian Art Academic Programme</u>, with the generous help of the Alphawood Foundation, is proud to announce the awardees of the 2016 Alphawood Scholarships. This year 23 students from five different countries in Southeast Asia have been awarded scholarships to study for the Postgraduate Diploma in Asian Art, MA History or Art and/or Archaeology and MA Religious Arts of Asia. The awardees are comprised of nine from Cambodia, five from Indonesia, four from Thailand, three from Myanmar/Burma and two from Vietnam.

The Alphawood Scholarships are available for another two years, the final round will be awarded in February 2018 for 2018/19 entry. The Scholarship covers tuition fees in full, a maintenance allowance towards the costs of living and studying in central London, as well as flights to and from the UK. Visa costs are also covered. The Maintenance allowance will be provided in line with the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) guidelines for London (Doctoral) and will be calculated pro-rata for programmes of less than a year. It is expected to cover the cost of accommodation. Read more about the Alphawood Scholarships here.

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Cambodian ministerial delegation at SOAS to plan major restoration of Banteay Chhmar temple: Field School to deliver on-site training in a broad range of skills associated with conservation of the temple

The Cambodian Minister of Culture and Fine Arts (MCFA), Phoeurng Sackona, visited SOAS with her top officials for an exceptional 3-day meeting to prepare a 5-year project to restore the major Cambodian temple of Banteay Chhmar and to set up a SOAS Field School beside it. This high level of commitment by the Cambodian government attests to the importance of the project for Cambodia and the growing reputation of the SOAS <u>Southeast Asian Academic Art Programme</u> (SAAAP).

The Field School will be the first site in the region for SAAAP, whose purpose is to create a network of counterpart institutions who send students to SOAS on Alphawood scholarships. The alumni of the Programme are key contributors to capacity-building in Southeast Asia to future tuning of SOAS teaching modules in line with regional needs. 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Scholars further discussions to develop a Field School and Conservation Programme at Banteay Chhmar

Members of the Southeast Asian Art Academic Programme Professor Ashley Thompson, Dr Christian Luczanits, Dr Louise Tythacott and Dr Peter Sharrock, and Project Coordinator Dr Joanna Wolfarth, spent ten days in Cambodia as part of the final component of the Alphawood-funded Scoping Phase for a Field School and Conservation Programme at 12th-century Banteay Chhmar Temple. A proposal for the long-term project – a partnership between SOAS and the Cambodian Ministry of Culture and Fine Arts – will be submitted to Alphawood in the first quarter of 2016. The SAAAP team were accompanied by officials from the Ministry of Culture and Fine Arts, representatives from Global Heritage Fund UK, and a team of conservation experts resident in Siem Reap. The group spent a day at Koh Ker temple complex, two days at Banteay Chhmar temple, a day at the Angkor Conservation Office and the APSARA Authority, a day at the National Museum and a morning at the Royal University of Fine Arts, in addition to other meetings and site visits in Siem Reap and Phnom Penh. 

In June-July 2015 SAAAP, in conjunction with King's College, hosted two linked events on Theravada Buddhism, with a view to launching a long-term collaborative research initiative on the art and archaeology of Theravadin Buddhist Southeast Asia. The events included a day symposium convened by SAAAP Academic Lead, Professor Ashley Thompson, entitled The Emergence of Theravada Buddhism in Cambodia: Southeast Asian Perspectives. 
Paris Study Trip 2016

In March 2016 Ashley Thompson, Pamela Corey, Louise Tythacott and Simone Green led a group of 24 MA students from the Department of the History of Art and Archaeology, including the 13-strong cohort of Alphawood MA students, on an exploration of Southeast Asian art museum and archival research collections in Paris.

The group enjoyed detailed and bespoke expert tours by scholars and curators at the Musée Guimet des Arts Asiatiques, the Ecole Française d'Extrême-Orient, and the Musée Cernuschi, as well as a day-trip to the Château de Fontainebleau to visit Empress Eugénie's Musée chinois with its extraordinary Thai collections. They also enjoyed a special visit to Vietnamese artist Truong Tan's studio and simply being together for a full three days of thinking and discussing Southeast Asian Art.

This year's trip built on the 2015 inaugural Paris study trip, and was again supported by the Southeast Asian Art Academic programme. We look forward to the trip becoming a yearly event for the Department.

Jalur Rempah (Spice Trail) at Jakarta's Museum Nasional Indonesia

From the region: Indonesia. Jakarta's Museum Nasional Indonesia mounted a Jalur Rempah (Spice Trail) exhibition in late October to show how spices had changed the entire history of the Indonesian archipelago. A video first qualified the use of 'Silk Road', pointing out that many commodities were traded and spices were as precious as silk and more voluminous. 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Professor David Llewelyn Snellgrove (29 June 1920 – 25 March 2016)
Professor David Snellgrove, a leading SOAS scholar of the religion, languages and history
of Buddhist India and Tibet, died earlier this year aged 95. He joined SOAS in 1950 and made a
major contribution to Tibetan and Buddhist studies.

The Southeast Asian Art Academic Programme enabled the endowment of a Senior Lectureship in Tibetan and Buddhist Art in the Department of History of Art and Archaeology in the School of Arts at SOAS. Dr Christian Luczanits was appointed as the first David L. Snellgrove Chair in Tibetan and Buddhist Art in September 2014.

Dr Tadeusz Skorupski, Emeritus Reader in the Department of Religions and Philosophies at SOAS; Cathy Cantwell, Associate Faculty Member, Oriental Institute, University of Oxford; and Francesca Fremantle, scholar and translator of Sanskrit and Tibetan works, have shared their stories of his life here.

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World-class Exhibition Hall at the National Museum in Bangkok, Thailand From the region, Thailand: The National Museum in Bangkok houses the largest collection of Thai art and artefacts in the world. The museum's front hall has now been furnished as a world-class gallery, bringing many of the museum's masterpieces into a single room. A monumental Buddha head from the Ayutthaya surveys the hall, while a graceful bronze Bodhisattva from the Peninsula takes centre stage with magnificent Khmer and Hindu sculptures. 
