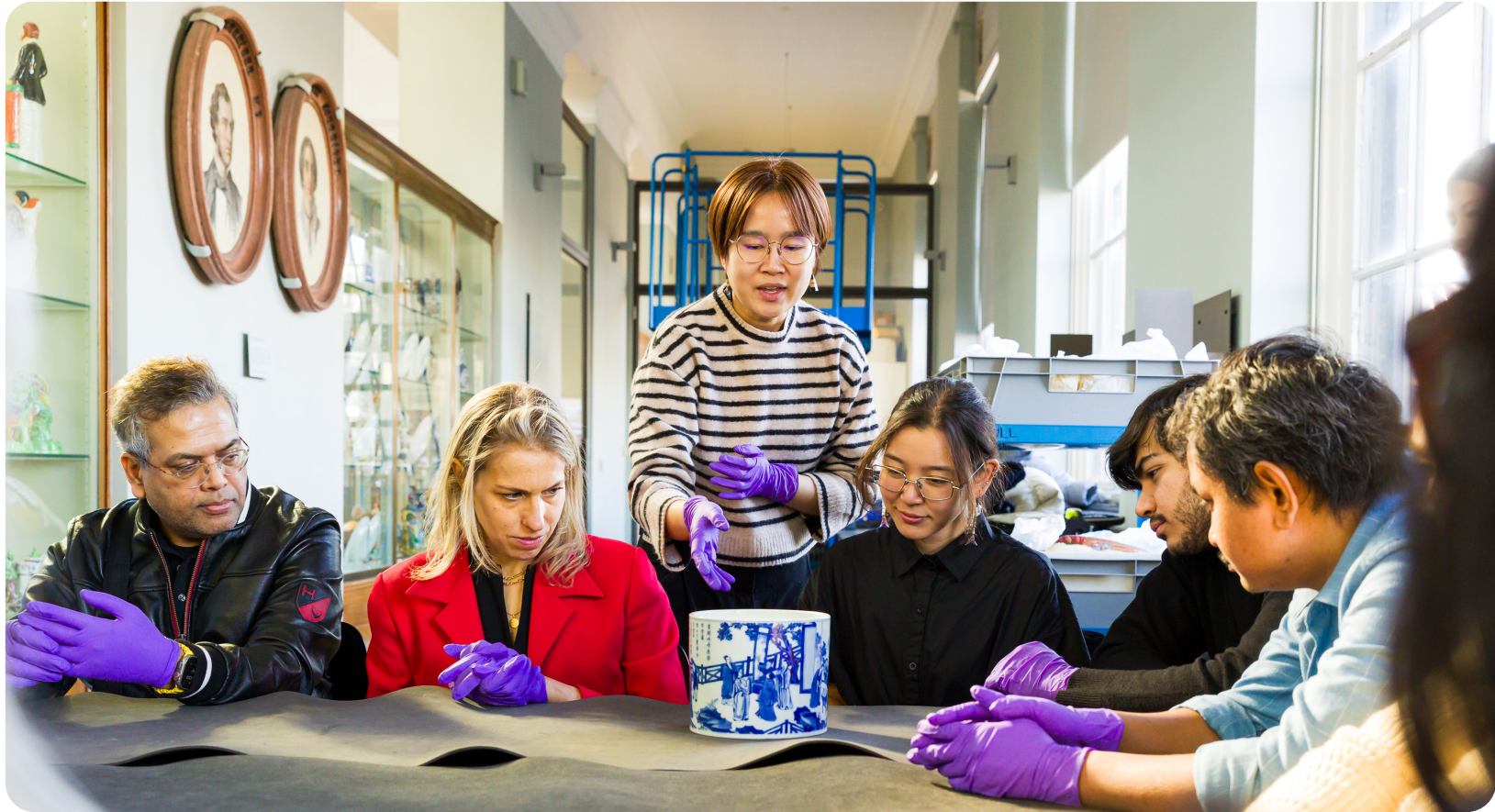

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Welcome

The SOAS-Alphawood Asian Art Programme offers a unique curriculum for the study of the Arts of Asia, the Middle East and North Africa: combining object-based learning within a rigorous postgraduate training in the critical analysis, evaluation and synthesis of art historical scholarship.

Throughout your time with us you will hear from a wide variety of specialists, including SOAS faculty and the wider academic community, museum curators, and art market professionals. We foster a learning environment in which students evaluate diverse perspectives before coming to their own conclusions.

Our students' learning is supported by our formal association with the British Museum and Victoria and Albert Museum here in London, offering unique access to the collections of these museums – both physically and digitally – and to the expertise of the curators who care for them.

We offer three distinct exit qualifications at taught postgraduate level, all available either or in person or online:

- **MA in Asian Art**
- **Postgraduate Diploma in Asian Art**
- **Postgraduate Certificate in Asian Art**

Our students receive tailored support from their programme director, module convenors, and dedicated administrative team. This support enables you to explore existing interests, discover new passions, and ask original questions, all while developing your academic abilities as an art historian.

In recent years our students have secured numerous internship opportunities unique to SOAS, with organisations and institutions including: the British Library, the British Council and Venice Biennale, and SOAS Gallery.

Our alumni occupy positions around the world in academia, museums and the art market. Many of our students join us while already working in the Arts and use their time at SOAS to diversify and deepen their knowledge and expertise, often developing assignments directly applicable in their professional lives. Others among our alumni go on to personally enriching voluntary roles, both alongside their pre-existing career or as a new project during retirement.

Our programme welcomes applicants who do not have an academic background in the Arts and Humanities, who are returning to higher education after a protracted period, or who come from non-traditional backgrounds. We place particular value on the diversity of perspectives this brings to our classroom.

- Visits and object study sessions at a variety of museums, galleries and auction houses, generally taking place on Tuesday and/or Thursday afternoons
- A series of asynchronous online lectures exploring critical thinking and current methods with associated seminars
- Recommended weekly readings
- Weekly review sessions
- Weekly one-to-one tutorials with your module convenors

In-Person 30-Credit Module Overviews

Arts of India

28 September – 16 December 2026 (annually)

From 2500 BCE to the present day, the *Arts of India* module explores the monumental, fine and decorative arts of South Asia. The module deals with architecture, sculpture, miniature painting, carved jades, carpets, textiles, furniture, jewellery, arms and armour, and the rural arts. The syllabus is broadly chronological and places the art in its religious and historical context. The module begins with an introduction to the Vedas, Buddhism, Jainism and Hinduism focusing on early Jain and Buddhist art and the principles of Hindu iconography, architecture, sculpture and wall painting. It emphasises the relationship between ritual and image in the study of medieval Hindu sculpture and architecture. Lectures cover Buddhist, Jain and Hindu manuscript painting.

The latter half of the module will explore Mughal and Rajput court art from the 16th to 18th centuries, with a particular focus on painting, jewellery and textiles.

Terra-cottas and other rural arts will also be covered and there will be lectures on modern and contemporary South Asian art.



In-Person 30-Credit Module Overviews (continued)

Arts of China

18 January - 07 April 2027 (annually)

The *Arts of China* module examines the material and visual cultures of China from the Neolithic period to the 21st century.

The course covers developments in metalwork, jade, lacquer, ceramics, painting, calligraphy, sculpture, and textiles. Lectures on history, religion, philosophy and literature provide a contextual framework for understanding these developments.

The module also considers the importance of patronage (imperial, elite, and popular), the impact of systems of belief (Confucianism, Buddhism, Daoism), and the role played by changes in the lives and social roles of artists. Technology and design approaches as well as the impact of interaction between China and the outside world are among the topics considered.



In-Person 30-Credit Module Overviews (continued)

Arts of the Buddhist World

03 May - 21 July 2027 (biennially)

The *Arts of the Buddhist World* module introduces you to the religious, historical and geographic context for the spread of Buddhism and Buddhist art across Asia: from Buddhism's origins two and a half millennia ago in Northern India, to its current status as a global religion.

The module begins with a brief overview of the life and teachings of the Buddha and considers the earliest Buddhist images in South Asia. We then trace the movement of Buddhist images, ideas and beliefs across the deserts and mountains of Central Asia into China. Exploring the adaptations and developments of Buddhism in China, we go on to examine how these iterations of Buddhist art and culture acted as a catalyst for subsequent developments; first in Korea and Japan, and later in Southeast Asia, Vietnam, Java and Cambodia. The module also explores the distinctive expressions of Esoteric Buddhism developed in Tibet, and the distinctive forms of Buddhist art engendered by the tradition in Burma, Thailand and Cambodia.

In exploring the diverse incarnations of Buddhist art across Asia, this module offers a broad and immersive introduction to the visual and material manifestations of one of the world's most significant religions.



In-Person 30-Credit Module Overviews (continued)

Arts of Japan & Korea

03 May - 21 July 2027 (biennially)

This module examines the *Arts of Japan and Korea* in relation to religious, historical, and social contexts. The module follows a broad chronological progression from pre-history to contemporary, with the first few weeks focusing primarily on religious art and architecture of ancient to medieval eras when the links between Japan and Korea were particularly strong. While the major part of the module is dedicated to Japan, the study of Korean art is integrated into the module in order to compare and contrast the cultural and art historical development of the two countries. The relationship with China is also considered in a larger East Asian context of transmission of ideas and trade.

The second part of the module examines secular traditions of painting, and a wide variety of decorative arts such as ceramics, lacquer, and textiles. The study of innovative modern and contemporary art, architecture and design towards the end of the module will encourage students to gain a sound understanding of both continuation and evolution of aesthetic ideas.

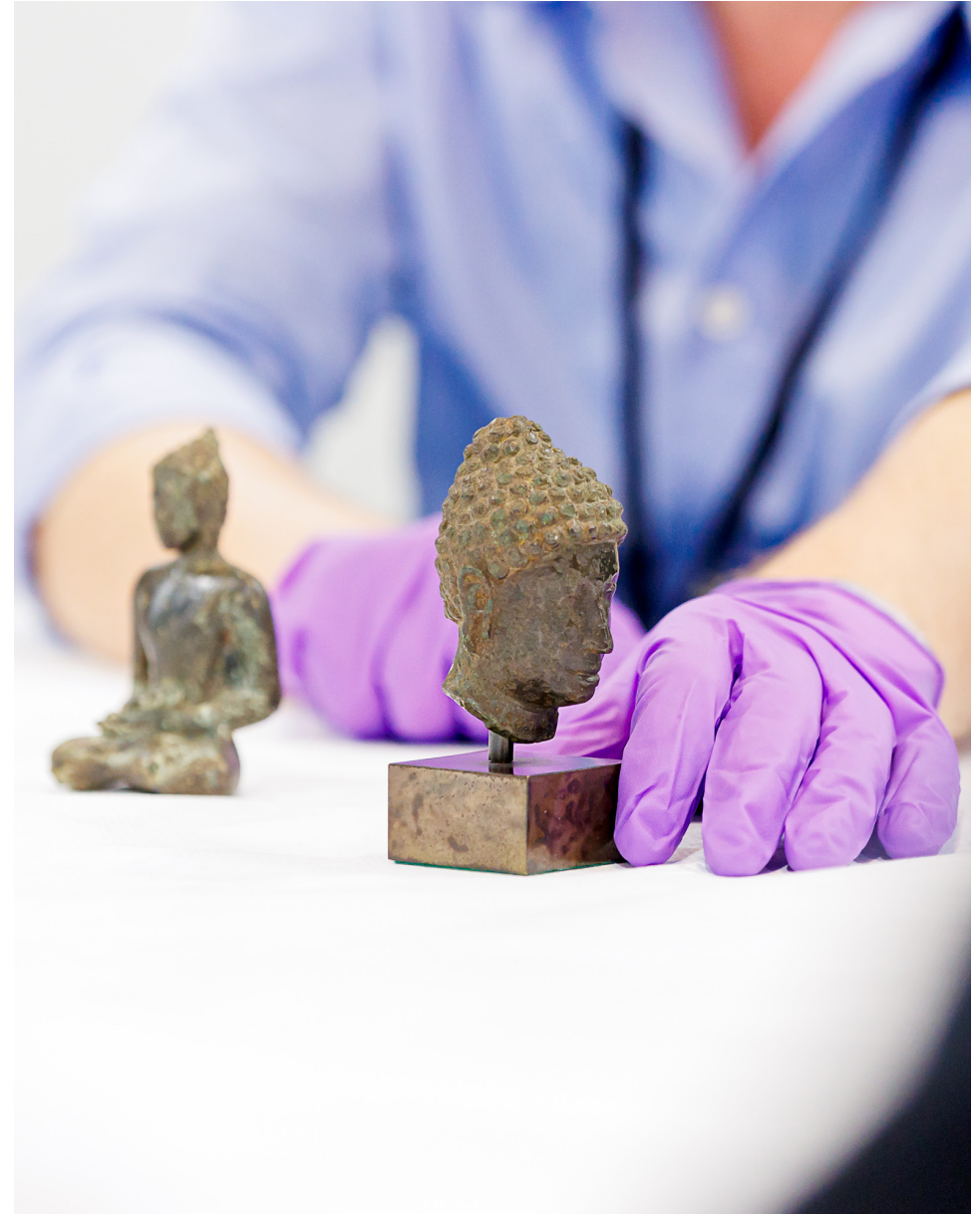
Arts of Southeast Asia

May - July 2028 (biennially)

This module covers the art of mainland and maritime Southeast Asia from prehistoric times to the present day.

A wide range of art objects are considered from the ethnographical to the classical and monumental arts of Buddhism, Hinduism and Islam. Art historical, archaeological and ethnographic interpretations are presented side by side so that this interdisciplinary approach enhances students' understanding of the vast artistic heritage of the region. The module covers the ethnographic art of the outer Indonesian islands and New Guinea, and the fertility, ancestor and spirit cults it expresses. It surveys the bronze age and the later dramatic development in social complexity engendered as the maritime trade routes developed throughout Southeast Asia and linked China with the Mediterranean. The profound impact of Hinduism and Buddhism is studied as these Indic systems rich in cosmology, philosophy and ritual infused the sacred monumental art and 'real-politik' of Cambodia, Java, Burma, Vietnam and Thailand and produced a boom in magnificent temple construction unmatched in human history.

The module ranges over Southeast Asia's cultural tapestry to offer insight on its statuary and reliefs, its textiles, ceramics, painting, lacquerware, shadow puppets, metalwork, calligraphy, and wood-carving.



In-Person 30-Credit Module Overviews (continued)

Arts of the Islamic World

May – July 2028 (biennially)

The *Arts of the Islamic World* module explores the origin and development of the arts produced in the central regions of the Muslim world from the 7th century CE to the present day: architecture, the arts of the book, ceramics, metalwork, glass as well as textiles and carpets.

The module follows a broadly chronological structure, ensuring clarity and continuity, and providing a coherent framework for study. Among the topics covered will be the use of decorative motifs such as calligraphy, the arabesque and geometric ornament and their evolution through different periods and regions. The module will explore what is particular to Islamic art and how artists in the Muslim world borrowed from other cultures as well as the impact Islamic art had on Europe. The influence of the China trade, the exchange of luxury items along the Silk route, and the contacts with Europe and the Mongols in Central Asia will also be examined.

Our online modules are designed to be accessible from anywhere in the world, and with those who will have other professional and/or personal commitments in mind (although we do recommend allocating 30 hours of study time per week).

Asia's Art Histories

28 September – 16 December 2026 (annually)

This module will introduce you to the latest ideas, concepts and approaches shaping art history today through focused case studies from across Asia.

Each week, Asia's Art Histories will present you with a mix of pre-recorded lectures and professionally filmed pre-recorded virtual visits to the British Museum and Victoria and Albert Museum. Each week your lectures and virtual visits are centred on a common theme and feature a range of speakers, including leading scholars, curators, and art market professionals. During the course of the module you will explore case studies from the following regions, religions and cultures: South Asia, China, Japan, Korea, Southeast Asia, the Islamic world and the Buddhist World. All case studies will focus on a common weekly theme.

An indicative list of themes include:

- n Art historiography
- n Art historical approaches to archaeological material
- n Approaches to material arts and material culture
- n Analysing architecture, space and environment
- n Approaches to visual arts and culture
- n Religious and ritual uses of objects, artworks and architecture

The module enables you to identify and consolidate your academic interests among the diverse artistic and cultural traditions of Asia.

Curating Asian Art

18 January - 07 April 2027 (biennially)

This module introduces you to the curation of Asian art, and visual and material culture. You will explore a diverse range of contexts in which Asian art is curated: from museums, to monuments, to commercial and private spaces.

Each week you explore a distinct theme or topic connected to curation and museology. These themes link your programme of study to current discussions and debates shaping curatorial practice and museological scholarship today. Each weekly theme is supported by carefully selected case studies, drawing on the diverse areas covered in the SOAS-Alphawood Postgraduate Diploma in Asian Art: South Asia, China, Japan, Korea, Southeast Asia, the Islamic World, and the Buddhist World. These case studies are delivered by a wide range of SOAS faculty and guest speakers, exposing you to a unique range of perspectives from across the museum, university and commercial arts sectors.

You will engage in practical, reflective assignments, with options to select projects and case studies that are relevant to your interests, aspirations, and the collections and institutions you have access to locally.

Curating Asian Art offers an in-depth introduction to curatorial and museum practice today. You will reflect on past and present curation of Asian art, while also developing skills and knowledge that will equip you to help shape the future of Asian Art's curation.

Arts of Southeast Asia (online)

03 May - 21 July 2027 (biennially)

This module covers the art of mainland and maritime Southeast Asia from prehistoric times to the present day, with a strong focus on pre-modern Hindu-Buddhist material. A wide range of art objects are considered from the ethnographical to the classical and monumental arts of Buddhism, Hinduism and Islam. Art historical, archaeological and ethnographic interpretations are presented side by side so that this inter-disciplinary approach enhances students' understanding of the vast artistic heritage of the region.

It surveys the bronze age and the later dramatic development in social complexity engendered as the maritime trade routes developed throughout Southeast Asia and linked China with the Mediterranean. The profound impact of Hinduism and Buddhism is studied as these Indic systems rich in cosmology, philosophy and ritual infused the sacred monumental art and 'real-politik' of Cambodia, Java, Burma, Vietnam and Thailand and produced a boom in magnificent temple construction unmatched in human history.

The module ranges over Southeast Asia's cultural tapestry to offer insight on its statuary and reliefs, its textiles, ceramics, painting, lacquerware, shadow puppets, metalwork, calligraphy, and wood-carving.



Online 30-Credit Module Overviews (continued)

Arts of the Buddhist World (online)

May – July 2028 (biennially)

The Arts of the Buddhist World module introduces you to the religious, historical and geographic context for the spread of Buddhism and Buddhist art across Asia: from Buddhism's origins two and a half millennia ago in Northern India, to its current status as a global religion. The course begins with a brief overview of the life and teachings of the Buddha and considers the earliest Buddhist images in South Asia. We then trace the movement of Buddhist images, ideas and beliefs across the deserts and mountains of Central Asia into China. Exploring the adaptations and developments of Buddhism in China, we go on to examine how these iterations of Buddhist art and culture acted as a catalyst for subsequent developments; first in Korea and Japan, and later in Southeast Asia, Vietnam, Java and Cambodia. The course also explores the distinctive expressions of Esoteric Buddhism developed in Tibet, and the distinctive forms of Buddhist art engendered by the tradition in Burma, Thailand and Cambodia.

In exploring the diverse incarnations of Buddhist art across Asia, this course offers a broad and immersive introduction to the visual and material manifestations of one of the world's most significant religions.



Our 15-Credit Modules

Our 15-credit modules are offered on both our in-person and online pathways.

They are all designed to support, enrich and expand your learning on the SOAS-Alphawood Asian Art Programme.

All students on our postgraduate programme must complete (at least) two of these modules to earn an academic award.

Analysing and Exploring the Arts

This module is compulsory and will be taken alongside (or prior to) your first 30-credit module.

Analysing and Exploring the Arts provides core training in object-based approaches to the History of Art for students on the SOAS-Alphawood Asian Art programme, through a combination of practical and reflective learning activities supported by multiple contributors.

The module explores the mechanics of art historical research, writing and argumentation, reflecting on different contexts for and priorities in the production and reception of art historical knowledge. Through a reflective process we support you in maximising the opportunities offered by in person encounters with objects, artworks and sites on this programme, while also cultivating a critical awareness of the conditions that shape those encounters. By comparing and contrasting approaches to analysis, interpretation and curation in museums and cultural institutions, auctions houses and commercial galleries, arts journalism, and academic writing we support you in situating objects of Asian Art and the narratives through which they are interpreted within the at times contested priorities of arts, culture, commerce and academia.

Assessment Methods

- A reflective portfolio, delivered as either a 2,500-word or 15-minute recorded submission (100%)

Our 15-Credit Modules (continued)

Asian Art: Theories, Practices and Objects

In this module, you will explore the theories and practices that have shaped the study of the arts of Asia, the Middle East and their diasporas.

You will critically interrogate a plurality of voices that shape modern and contemporary art historical theories and methodologies. These will be examined alongside analysis of contemporary, modern and historic aesthetics, art discourses and art practices. Via synthesising a wide variety of materials, you will develop a critical understanding of historic development of art historical inquiry in Asia.

The module aims to bring together theoretical perspectives, practical examples and object-based encounters, fostering critical and considered engagement with your course material and allowing you to develop your own lines of enquiry.

Assessment Methods

- Literature Review (1,000 words) or presentation (ten minutes) (30%)
- Essay (70%)

Independent Study Project in Asian Art History

The Independent Study Project in Asian Art History allows you to develop a focused project on a single topic in Asian Art history. You will consolidate the skills and approaches you have developed throughout your programme, by applying them to a single output. Your output can be an essay (3000 words), an exhibition proposal with selected object catalogue entries (3000 words), an extended presentation (20 mins), or a guided tour of a museum gallery (20 mins). You will work with a supervisor to select a topic, develop a formative proposal, select and appraise appropriate sources, and research and deliver your final output. This is an opportunity for you to pursue a singular, focused passion, communicating and consolidating your understanding, enthusiasm and critical engagement with the content of the SOAS-Alphawood Postgraduate Diploma in Asian Art programme.

The Independent Study Project in Asian Art History includes five workshops that help you conceive, focus and develop your project, and six 30 minute 1-1 meetings with your supervisor.

You can complete this course alongside your final 30-credit module or in a future term (visa permitting), so long as you complete within your maximum period of registration.

Assessment Methods

- Annotated Bibliography, 500 words (10%)
- Final submission of 3,000 words or a 20-minute presentation (90%)

Our 15-Credit Modules (continued)

Asian Art in the Museum

26 July - 06 August 2027

Runs annually, **in-person** in London

This course is an intensive, two-week immersion in object-based study of Asian art.

You will explore a range of objects and artworks in situ, predominantly in the British Museum and Victoria and Albert Museum, meeting with the curators who care for these collections.

The course is built around ten focused case studies, each consisting of a lecture, seminar, and related gallery or reserve collection visit. Case studies are drawn from the full range of regions and contexts covered in the SOAS-Alphawood Asian Art Programme: South Asia, China, Japan, Korea, Southeast Asia, the Islamic world and the Buddhist world. Each of the two weeks focuses on a single theme or topic that is central to art history and/or museum curation today. You will contextualise the objects encountered on this course within the diverse geographies, cultures and contexts from which the objects you study originate, and through which they have travelled to arrive in London today. You will actively contribute to class discussions and informal presentations in museums and galleries.

This module provides an immersive introduction to the object-based study of Asian art. It is an ideal complement to students studying any of our online distance learning modules who wish to acquire hands on experience of object based learning.

Assessment Methods

Halfway through the module you will submit a short reflection on your experience of direct study of objects in museum galleries and stores. Feedback on this short assessment will help you to hone your final submission: either an analytical essay or a curatorial proposal.

Ways to join Asian Art in the Museum

As your first module

Begin your journey on the SOAS-Alphawood Asian Art Programme by joining us for *Asian Art in the Museum* and you will earn 15 credit points at FHEQ level 6.

This route requires a supplementary fee of £1,840.

At any other time

Complement your journey on the SOAS-Alphawood Asian Art Programme by completing *Asian Art in the Museum* at any other point within your maximum period of registration and you will earn 15 credit points at FHEQ level 7.

This route requires a supplementary fee of £1,840.

As an independent programme

Asian Art in the Museum is available to take independently of further study for a fee of £2,500 and you will earn 15 credit points at FHEQ level 6.

Accommodation

Please note that accommodation is not provided and must be arranged at your own expense.



Our Dissertation Module

Dissertation in Asian Art

Runs January - May 2028 (in person)
and January - September 2028 (online)

For those enrolled on the MA in Asian Art (in-person or online), our dissertation module will be your capstone module, taken after you have completed 120 credit points in other modules.

This module is an opportunity for you to develop a chosen project in depth and detail. You will be supported by a dedicated supervisor, as well as a dissertation convenor who will work with you as a cohort.

You do not need to begin your dissertation module with a fully defined project, only an area of interest or indicative topic framed with some initial research questions.

We will support you in shaping your project and developing your research and writing with 5 hours of lectures and 5 hours of workshops.

Supervision will involve 3 hours of one-to-one tutorials with your dedicated supervisor.

You will have full access to the SOAS Library - the UK's dedicated research library in Asia and Africa.

Assessment Methods

- Annotated Bibliography, 700 words (10%)
- Dissertation of 10,000 words (90%)



Auditing

Auditing Policy

We offer auditing spaces on our modules to those who are not seeking an academic qualification.

Those who choose to audit the course enjoy full access as a SOAS student to all teaching on the programme, university resources and even the option of weekly one-to-one tutorials with their module convenors, but are not required to complete any assessments.

Auditors receive no credit points and cannot earn an academic award for their time on the programme.

Application process

Auditors must be eligible for study on the programme as per our entry requirements and must submit an application to join each teaching session as an individual course of study.

Transferring to accredited study

Should you wish to do so, we will endeavour to support auditors transferring to accredited study within the first two weeks of the teaching session. This may not be possible for in-person study if visa restrictions apply.

Deposits and Payment Schedules

Successful applicants must secure their place on the programme by making a £500 deposit payment, which will be credited towards your total tuition fee. The remaining fee balance must be paid at least five weeks prior to your start date.

Students studying part-time can opt to pay in three installments (60 credit blocks). Installments paid in future academic years will be subject to any annual increase in tuition fees.

Annual Fee Increases

Tuition fees are subject to annual increases (applied from each September). Part-time students paying in installments are protected from any annual increase exceeding 5%.

Alumni and Family Discount (in-person study only)

A 25% reduction in tuition fees is available to all alumni who have an Undergraduate degree in any subject from SOAS, but no higher qualification. The same discount is available to any applicant whose family member (defined as grandparent, parent, sibling, child or spouse) is a SOAS graduate or staff member.

Please note that the reduction only applies to the first year of a full-time course or equivalent part-time enrolment.

Scholarships

The Alphawood Scholarships

Alphawood scholarships are available to support residents of Southeast Asia (Brunei, Cambodia, East Timor, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar/Burma, Singapore, Thailand or Vietnam) in completing the SOAS-Alphawood Postgraduate Diploma in Asian Art via either our in-person or online pathways and the MA via online learning.

The scholarship covers full tuition fees for the complete programme as well as a stipend to cover living costs during term time. For scholars studying in person, financial support is also available to cover travel, visas and other preparatory costs.

Alphawood scholarships also provide support for our students to advance their English-language proficiency through dedicated courses at the SOAS Department of International Foundation Courses and English Language Studies (IFCELS).

The Alphawood scholarships form part of an academic programme which is generously supported by the Alphawood Foundation (Chicago). The remit of the programme is to support and advance, through study and research, the understanding and preservation of Southeast Asian Buddhist and Hindu art and architecture from ancient to pre-modern times.

Alphawood scholars are selected with the expectation that they, as alumni, will be in a position to apply the learning and skills they gain while on award to the benefit of the galleries, museums, heritage organisations, universities, government departments and other institutions in the Southeast Asian region in which they may go on to work.

Since 2014, Alphawood has provided for over 100 scholarships which supported Southeast Asian scholars' postgraduate study at the Diploma, MA and MPhil/PhD levels at SOAS.



Scholarships (continued)

The Hettie Elgood Scholarship

This scholarship covers full tuition fees for the in-person pathway of the SOAS-Alphawood Postgraduate Diploma in Asian Art and an allowance to cover living costs during term time.

The scholarship is open to anyone, anywhere in the world who is not financially able to pursue the course without a full scholarship and stipend.

We strongly encourage applicants who would not have considered the programme without the opportunity afforded by this scholarship.

We hope the scholarship will be a transformative opportunity, enabling the successful applicant to pursue a career related to Asian art, such as academia, curatorial or museum work, or a position in the commercial art world.

Online Postgraduate Certificate Scholarship

This scholarship covers full tuition fees for the online pathway of the SOAS-Alphawood Postgraduate Certificate in Asian Art.

The scholarship is open to anyone, anywhere in the world who is not financially able to pursue the course without a full scholarship and stipend.

Entry Requirements

Entry Criteria

We will consider applications with the equivalent of a UK undergraduate degree at 2:2 or above. International qualification equivalents are listed on [our website](#).

In addition to degree classification, we take into account other elements of the application including a supporting statement and references. While references are optional, they can help build a stronger application profile if you fall below the 2:2 requirement or have non-traditional qualifications.

Our programme welcomes applicants who do not have an academic background in the Arts and Humanities, who are returning to higher education after a protracted period, or who come from non-traditional backgrounds. We place particular value on the diversity of perspectives this brings to our classroom.

Accessibility

Applications are considered on the standard academic criteria, regardless of any disability. We do recommend that you contact the Disability & Neurodiversity Team on disabilities@soas.ac.uk before submitting your application so that any potential adjustments can be discussed and so that you can decide if SOAS is suitable for you.

We will do all that we can to make it possible for you to study at SOAS but in the unlikely event that we are not able to make the adjustments necessary we will let you know as soon as possible.

Visa Requirements for In-Person Study

All international students (non-UK and Irish nationals) looking to study in-person will be required to follow UK Visa and Immigration policy.

International students are required to study our in-person programme via our **full-time** route.

Programmes of study lasting longer than six months (Postgraduate Diploma, MA) will require a **Student Visa**.

Programmes of study lasting fewer than six months (Postgraduate Certificate, auditing a module) can be joined as a standard visitor to the UK.

You can use the [UK Government's visa checking tool](#) to find out which type of visa you will require for periods of in-person study over or under six months.

Asian Art in the Museum can be joined as a standard UK visitor if it is your only period of in-person study with us as part of your programme.

Please note that individuals in the UK with Graduate Visa status are not eligible to enrol on our in-person programme.

There are no visa requirements for online study.

Please be aware that, regardless of any offer you hold for our programme, permission to enter the UK is always at the discretion of the UK Visa and Immigration authorities.

Entry Requirements (continued)

Language Requirements

All international applicants not from a government-recognised Majority English Speaking Country must be able to show that their English is of a high enough standard to successfully engage with and complete the programme.

The required standard for direct entry is IELTS level 6.5 overall with at least 6.0 in all sub-scores.

- Validated evidence of your degree (transcript and/or certificate, officially translated into English if international)
- Evidence of English Language ability (if required)

Although we do not have a closing date for applications, early application is advised for all programmes.

Places will be allocated on a first-come, first-served basis.



Interviews

Applicants may be invited to attend an informal interview with the Programme Director, who will assess the candidate's commitment and aptitude. No special preparation for this interview is necessary.

Accommodation

London/UK residency and full-time attendance is required for in-person modules. Those relocating to London are responsible for their own accommodation and are strongly advised to allow ample time to make suitable arrangements before their course begins. SOAS offers support for finding a variety of accommodation options, including halls of residence for postgraduate students, shared student housing or private rental.

Ensuring you have the best possible experience as a student on the SOAS-Alphawood Asian Art Programme is our utmost priority. Learning

The flexible nature of study, allowing you to select your modules and complete the course on a part-time basis, is aimed to fit around those who work or have personal commitments.

In each in-person module, art history of a particular region or religious tradition is introduced in a broadly chronological framework. In our online modules, you are introduced to current themes and approaches in art history through focused case studies.

Skills

Across the programme, you will develop key skills in documenting, analysing and contextualising objects, alongside transferable academic skills in essay writing and presentation. This ensures that candidates who do not have an art history background are able to adapt quickly to art historical academic writing. Many of our students come from varied academic and professional backgrounds and we ensure that they are well equipped to handle the material alongside students from an arts background, with dedicated training offered in our 15-credit module, Analysing and Exploring the Arts.

Many of our graduates, including those with no prior background in art history or archaeology, go on to further study, including taught postgraduate and PhD projects at SOAS and other institutions worldwide.

Specialist Art Short Courses

Alongside our postgraduate degrees, our specialist short courses have become an integral part of the SOAS-Alphawood Asian Art programme.

These courses are open to all and aimed at those from a wide variety of backgrounds seeking to broaden their knowledge of specialised areas of Asian art. Short courses are ideal for those who do not have the opportunity to attend our full-time programme. They also serve as a taster to our longer, more immersive modules. These courses enable you to explore specialist areas which are not covered in depth within our postgraduate modules.

In-person specialist art courses explore a single topic over an intensive four-day programme, including lectures by leading experts. Where appropriate we also include practising artists, musicians and object-study sessions.

Online specialist art courses offer eight weekly lectures by leading experts from academia, museums and the art market. Lectures are followed by in-depth discussions moderated by the course convenor.

In 2026/27 we are thrilled to offer a combination of weekly, online short courses as well as four-day, in-person courses.
