From the new JRC Chair

Welcome back everybody to the new term. A special welcome is due our many Academic visitors and to our MA, MPhil and PhD students. Your participation in the activities of the Japan Research Centre alongside that of the SOAS academic staff does much to make it the vibrant research centre it is. Welcome, too, to Gary Scott and to Dr. Chris Jones from the University of Kent. Gary stands in for Dr Hoshi, on leave at the University of the Basque Country. Dr. Jones will be teaching the MA course on Government and politics in post-war Japan.

After 4 years as JRC, Dr Screech has stepped down, and he will be a hard act to follow. One of his notable innovations was the launch of a Monday night seminar series in Japanese. This proved a tremendous success, with attendance occasionally outstripping that of the Wednesday seminars. I aim to continue the practise from Term 2. The new academic year starts with a new-look SOAS. Three Faculties - Languages and cultures, Law and social sciences and Arts and humanities - now accommodate our many departments. The implication of all this for the JRC and other regional centres has yet to be worked out, but the good news is that the School has created a Centres and Programmes Office headed by Sarah Jones who works to Professor Lisa Croll as Vice Principal for External Affairs. The not-so-good news is that the CPO is under-resourced. It oversees the work of six regional centres. Then there is the budget: the allocation for each Centre this year remains £500. The JRC needs to be inviting scholars from across Europe to participate in its seminars and, of course, covering expenses. On our present budget – even with the additional income from the JLPT - this is out of the question.

On a positive note: we have more applications for the JLPT than ever. Some 650 students will take these language proficiency tests this year. The JLPT is an undertaking of real importance for SOAS, though a way needs to be found for the JRC itself to benefit more.

By the time you get the newsletter, the new-improved JRC website should be finally up and running and the old one discarded. If you have any comments/suggestions on the Website and on the Newsletter itself, please send them to me.
